Residual Hearsay

If you are in a position where an out-of-court statement is beneficial to you but the declarant is unavailable and the out of court statement does not fall under an exemption or exception to the Hearsay Rule, you might have an opportunity to have that out-of-court statement admitted under O.C.G.A. §24-8-807 states that "[a] statement not specifically covered by any law but having equivalent circumstantial guarantees of trustworthiness shall not be excluded by the hearsay rule." However, to allow and admit the statement as permissible testimony, the trial court must determine the following three things per the statute:

1. The statement is offered as evidence of a material fact;
2. The statement is more probative on the point for which it is offered than any other evidence which the proponent can procure through reasonable efforts; and
3. The general purposes of the rules of evidence and the interests of justice will best be served by admission of the statement into evidence.

Once the trial court has found that the above-mentioned factors have been satisfied, it is within the trial courts discretion to allow the hearsay statement in the trial of the Defendant(s). Because the court is required to make these determinations, you as prosecutors need to know in advance whether you have such a statement that you would like to admit into evidence. This is due to the fact that you are required to provide notice to the Court and to the Defendant of the out of court statement, the name of the individual who made the statement, and the name of the individual who heard the statement that you intend to use to testify to it. The Georgia Supreme Court has said that Rule 807 applies only when there are certain guarantees of trustworthiness because such statement is considered sufficiently trustworthy due to the circumstances in which the statement is originally made. *Tanner v. State* 301 Ga. 852 (2017). Statements are considered "sufficiently trustworthy" not because of the credibility of the witnesses reporting them in court, but because of the circumstances under which they were originally made. *Smart v. State* 299 Ga. 414 (2016). What this means is that we should look to the nature of the relationship between the hearsay declarant and the hearsay witness, as well as the circumstances in which it was made to determine this. *Miller v. State*, 303 Ga. 1(2018). For example, I once had a witness who was the last person to see the victim alive with the Defendant before the Victim drove off with the Defendant. The victim was missing for a month before police found his body decomposing in a ditch. The witness told the Victim's best friend two days after the disappearance that the Victim was last seen riding in the Defendant's car. The witness unfortunately passed away and his potential testimony that the Defendant was the last person he saw the victim with alive became hearsay. However, due to the fact that the witness and the victim's best friends also had a close relationship (she took care of him when he was sick, cooked food for him, brought him home for dinner) in addition to the fact that the statement the witness made to the victim's best friend was made in circumstance in which they were worried about him and looking for him, it was a statement that had certain guarantees of trustworthiness such that it would be admissible.



Paws, Policy, and Protection at the Capitol

Two key proposals include incorporating animals into protective orders and expanding laws against animal fighting to cover cockfighting, while also prohibiting children from witnessing such violence.

Deputy District Attorney Jill Hollander and other speakers gathered at Liberty Plaza to emphasize that all citizens deserve safety and to denounce violence in any form. FCDA staff actively engaged with attendees, legislators, law enforcement, and the adorable adoptable dogs present, united in the mission to protect all members of our community—both human and animal.



FCDAO's very own Jill Hollander joined Fulton County Government Television on two episodes of Experience Fulton: Healthy Aging to shine a light on elder abuse, how the human-animal bond plays a vital role in the lives of older adults, and how we can protect our senior community. I hope this message finds you well. I recently had the honor of returning to Atlanta to testify as the lead detective in the case for Trinh Huynh. This marks my second homicide trial alongside Gautam Rao, and I want to commend both him and Jazmin Dilligard for their outstanding presentation of the case and the impactful closing arguments. It was a poignant moment to witness jurors, prosecutors, and family members of the victim moved to tears.

Trinh's sister articulated it beautifully when she conveyed to the jury that her sister represented every law-abiding citizen—reminding us that any of us could have been in her position, simply going about our daily lives and being murdered by a coward for no apparent reason.

Since my departure from Atlanta PD in November 2019, I have had the privilege of returning to testify as the lead detective in several cases. It has truly been a pleasure collaborating with your attorneys and investigators.

I appreciate the ample time provided for trial preparation, travel, as well as the excellent communication within your team. Everyone has been considerate of my time, which is a courtesy that is greatly valued.

Mike Green and Fred Glenn (my APD classmate) have consistently been my main contacts in your office, and I would like to respectfully add Antonio Long to that list after this case.

You are doing an exceptional job for the City of Atlanta, and I sincerely hope you are granted an even greater platform in the years ahead.

DENIM Day



Denim Day is a day in April encouraging people to wear jeans to raise awareness of rape and sexual assault. In the 1990s, an Italian court overturned a ruling that dismissed an incident as not sexual assault because the victim wore tight jeans. This implied that the victim would have had to help the perpetrator remove the jeans and was therefore consensual. Enraged by the verdict, women in the Italian Parliament wore jeans in protest on the steps of the Supreme Court. This gained international attention and inspired the California Senate and Assembly to do the same. In 1999, Patti Occhiuzzo Giggans, Executive Director of Peace Over Violence, created the first Denim Day event in LA to shatter myths about why women and girls are raped.

On Wednesday, April 30, 2025, the Fulton County District Attorney's Office wore denim to stand in solidarity with all survivors.




GRANTS CORNER

Two happenings this quarter

A new grant, Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN): Gun Violence Reduction, "Preventing and Assisting Victims of Violence on College Campus" has been awarded to the office of the District Attorney. Atlanta's gun violence shatters safety on college campuses and increases fear and anxiety for students. Shootings near and on campus; threats with weapons resulting in sexual assault of students near and on campus; police vacancies, and the mental health decline of students who feel unsafe, are challenges disrupting student learning. The proposed pilot project would significantly alter the support landscape for victims of gun violence in Fulton County on Atlanta College Campuses by pulling community partners and introducing law enforcement representatives to hold conversations of safety combined with training and new technology to empower students. Our very own Angela Johnson and Kendall Watkins will take the lead in launching this project. Stay tuned for updates and how you can be involved.

Grant funded staff and supervisors gathered with Michele Henry, Eva Retana, and Rushondra Davenport to discuss on-going loading of activity reports and other grant-funded project responsibilities.
