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Did you know that Women's History Month went from one day, to one week, to one month? Every year, March is designated Women's History Month by presidential proclamation. <sup>1</sup>

Women's History Month was initially just International Women's Day, which commemorated the February 28th meeting of socialists and suffragists in Manhattan in 1909.<sup>2</sup> On March 19, 1911, the first International Women's Day was celebrated in Austria, Switzerland, Germany and Denmark,<sup>3</sup> though the holiday wasn't widely celebrated in the United States until the United Nations began sponsoring it in 1975.<sup>4</sup>

In 1977, in order to persuade school principals to comply with the recently passed Title IX, a task force in California created Women's History Week.<sup>5</sup> They used that week to celebrate the accomplishments of women. In March 1980, after momentous celebrations began spreading across the United States, President Jimmy Carter declared that March 8 was officially the start of National Women's History Week.<sup>6</sup> That same year, Utah Senator Orrin Hatch and Maryland Representative Barbara Mikulski co-sponsored the first Joint Congressional Resolution declaring the week of March 8, 1981, National Women's History Week.<sup>7</sup> By 1987,

Congress declared the entire month of March Women's History Month.<sup>8</sup> Since then, every president has declared the month of March Women's History Month.

So, why do we celebrate Women's History Month? It's a reminder of the accomplishments of women to our culture and society. From science to politics, it's is a chance to reflect on the trailblazing women who have led the way for change. This year's theme, Women Providing Healing, Promoting Hope, is a tribute to caregivers and frontline workers who have worked tirelessly during the Covid-19 pandemic for the greater good in both public and private life.<sup>9</sup> So on March 8, wear the official color of International Women's Day, purple, to show solidarity.

# **Xernona Clayton Brady**

#### Atlanta's Giant



Standing at 4' 11, Xernona Clayton Brady (nee Brewster) is a giant in Atlanta, where she has been a force in the civil-rights movement and broadcasting industry since the 1960's. She worked closely with Dr. and Mrs. Martin Luther King, Jr., helping to organize fundraising for the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC). Her civic duties did not stop there; she coordinated activities for the Doctor's Committee for the Implementation, a project aimed at desegregating Atlanta's hospitals. After making noise in Atlanta, Mrs. Brady went to Washington D.C. to meet with then-President Lyndon B. Johnson to discuss desegregating all U.S. hospitals. In 1965, Johnson signed the Medicare Act of 1965, officially desegregating the nation's hospitals and other healthcare facilities.

Mrs. Brady continued her advocacy by being a voice for Black people in a new way. In 1967, The Xernona Clayton Show aired on WAGA-TV, making Mrs. Brady the first Black person in the Southeast to have her own television program. In the debut year

of her television program, Mrs. Brady had a Grand Dragon of the Klu Klux Klan as a guest, and she was able to get him to denounce the Klan and refrain from using hate speech.

In the 1970's, Mrs. Brady expanded her impact on the broadcast industry. She began working with Turner Broadcasting Systems (TBS) producing documentaries and hosting a public affairs show. Mrs. Brady eventually earned an executive position and became a liaison between the network and Black community organizations. Mrs. Brady has received national honors for broadcast, leadership and civil rights. She paid the recognition forward with The Trumpet Awards, which celebrates Black excellence and achievement. This year is the 30th anniversary of what is now known as the **Bounce Trumpet Awards**.



International Women's Day is celebrated on March 8 every year. In the U.S., the first National Women's Day was celebrated on February 28, 1909, to honor a garment workers' strike the year before when women protested poor working conditions, low wages and sexual harassment. This date was later changed after a fire at the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory in New York killed 146 young female workers, most of whom were immigrants. Women historically have been relegated to traditional roles as mothers and homemakers. Today, they fill key roles in society, taking up jobs and leadership positions. International Women's Day is observed by the United Nations, which sets a theme each year. The 2022 theme is "Gender Equality Today for a Sustainable Tomorrow." The U.N. will recognize "the contribution of women and girls around the world, who are leading the charge on climate change adaptation, mitigation and response, to build a more sustainable future for all." Multiple organizations have similar rallying cries for this year: "Break the Bias" and "Women Providing Healing, Promoting Hope."

Despite the discoveries, bravery, dedication and talents exhibited by women, they continue to endure second-class status and civil- and human-rights violations. International Women's Day remains relevant today because the world is not gender-equal yet even though women make up about half of the world's population.

Although not a holiday in most countries, International Women's Day is observed differently in different parts of the world. Some businesses celebrate by giving female employees half a day off, while others give flower bouquets.

#### **Notable Events in U.S. Women's History**

**July 19-20, 1848:** In the first women's rights convention organized by women, the Seneca Falls Convention is held in New York, where there are 300 attendees, including organizers Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Lucretia Mott. Sixty-eight women and 32 men (including abolitionist Frederick Douglass) sign the Declaration of Sentiments, which sparked decades of activism, eventually leading to the passage of the 19th Amendment, granting women the right to vote. May 29, 1851: A former slave turned abolitionist and women's rights activist, Sojourner Truth delivers her famous "Ain't I a Woman?" speech at the Women's Rights Convention in Akron, Ohio. "And ain't I a woman? Look at me! Look at my arm! I have ploughed and planted, and gathered into barns, and no man could head me! And ain't I a woman? I could work as much and eat as much as a man—when I could get it—and bear the lash as well! And ain't I a woman? I have borne 13 children, and seen most all sold off to slavery, and when I cried out with my mother's grief, none but Jesus heard me! And ain't I a woman?" Contemporaneous reports of Truth's speech did not include this slogan, and quoted Truth in standard English. In later years, this slogan was further distorted to "Ain't I a Woman?" reflecting the false belief that as a formerly enslaved woman, Truth would have had a Southern accent. **December 10, 1869:** The legislature of the territory of Wyoming passes America's first woman suffrage law, granting women the right to vote and hold office. In 1890, Wyoming is the 44th state admitted to the Union and becomes the first state to allow women the right to vote.
