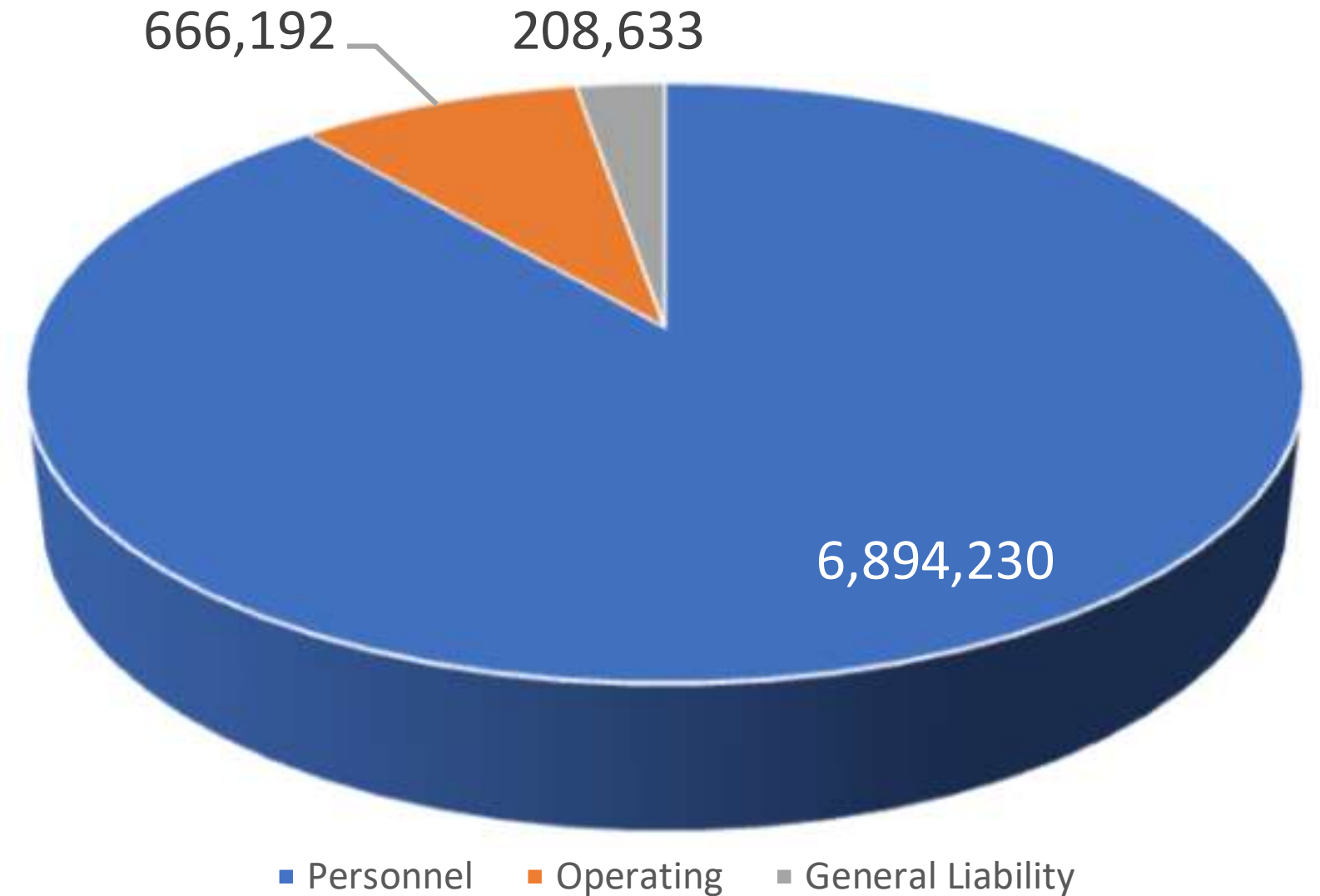


Fulton County Marshal's Office Service Areas

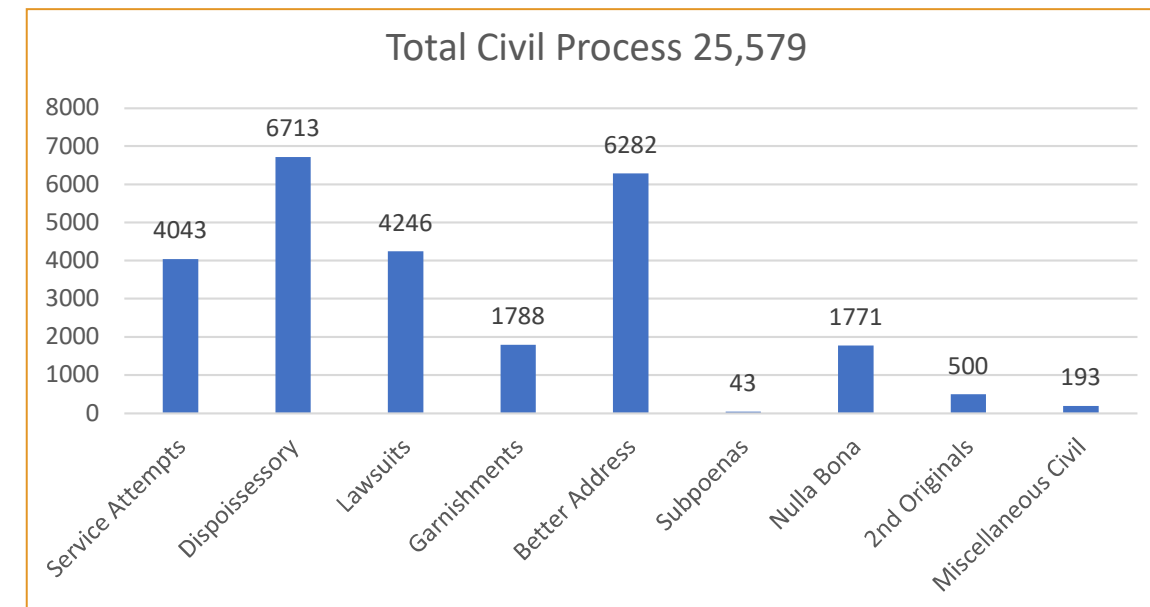
Performance Reports / Training



Civil Division

The Civil Division is organized into three geographic units: Central, North, and South. Each unit is responsible for the service and execution of civil processes issued by the State and Magistrate Courts. The North and South Units also provide courtroom security at their respective Service Centers, ensuring a safe and orderly environment for judicial proceedings.

In addition to civil enforcement duties, deputies within the Civil Division respond to emergency calls for service, including 911 dispatches, and engage in officer-initiated activity when crimes are observed in progress. This dual role underscores the Division's commitment to both judicial support and public safety across the county.



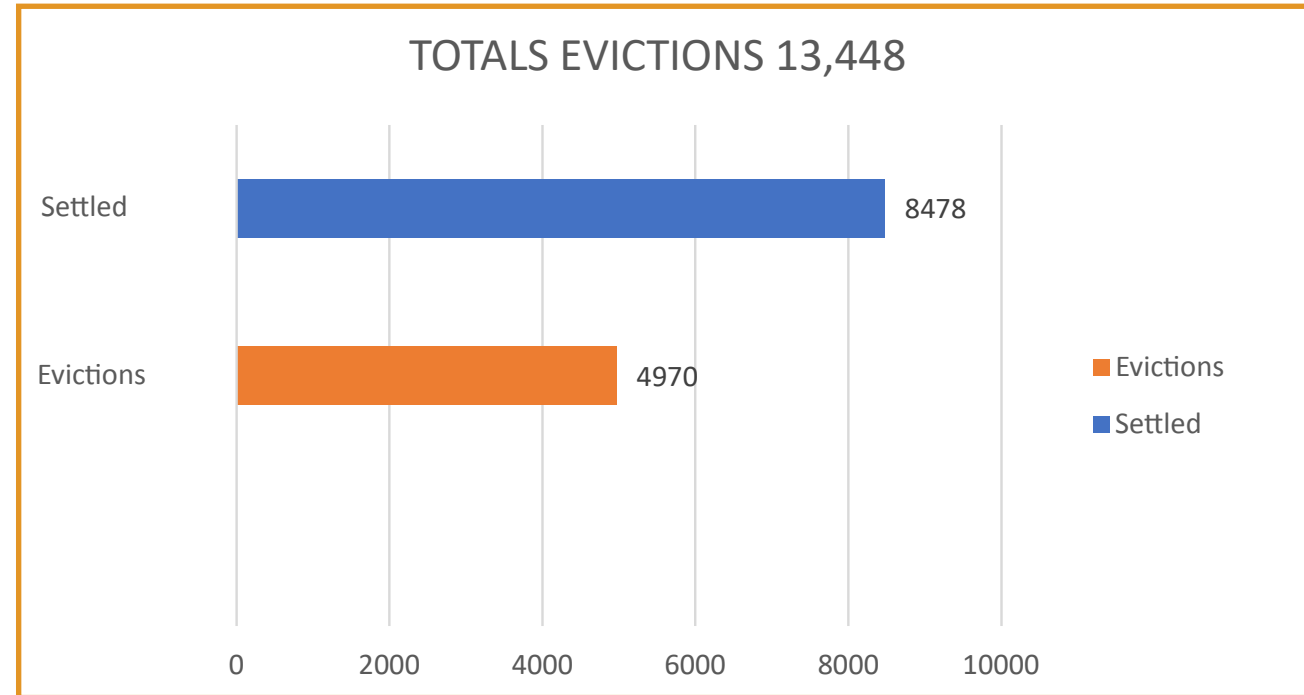

Eviction Division

The Eviction Division is tasked with executing all court-ordered writs of possession. Under these directives, the Marshal oversees the removal of the defendant and their personal property from the premises, ensuring that full and peaceful possession is restored to the plaintiff.



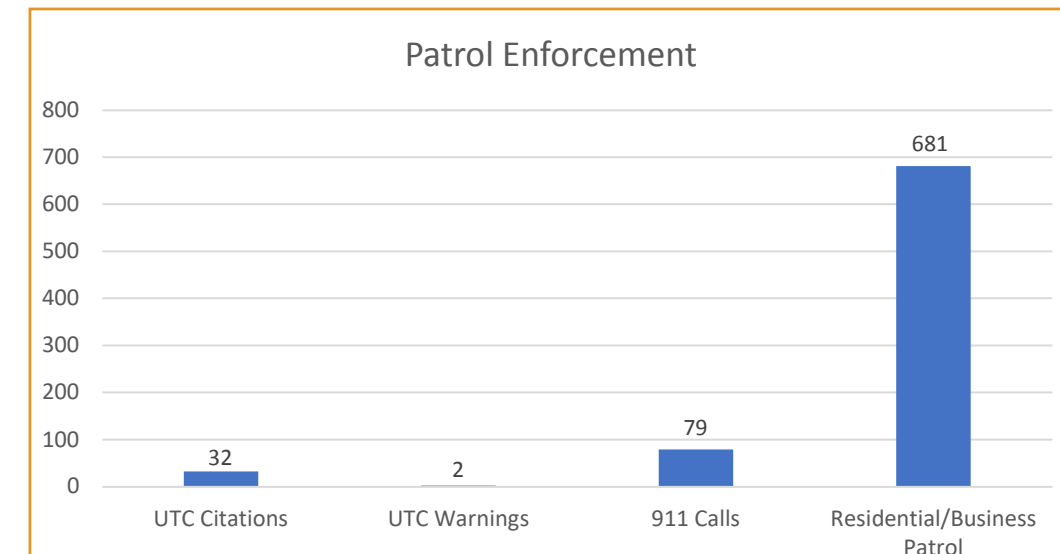
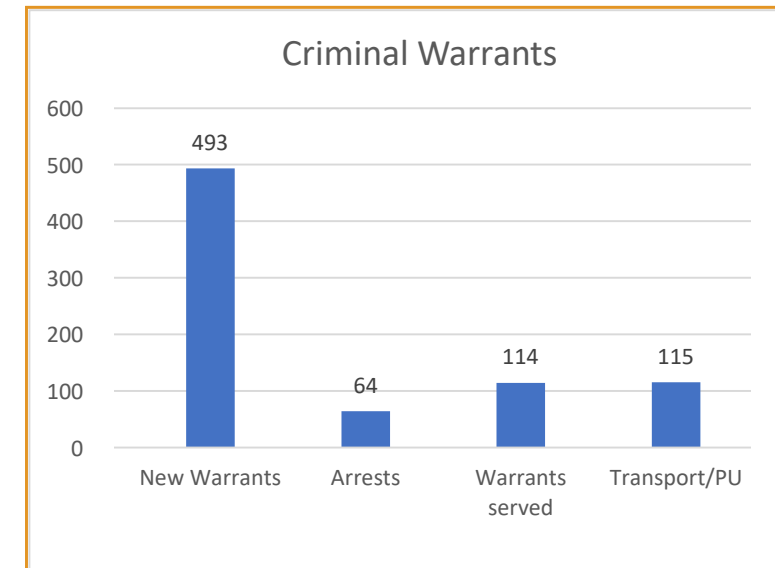

Criminal Warrants & Patrol Enforcement

The Special Operation Unit is responsible for executing Magistrate and State Court warrants. These warrants include probation violation, domestic violence, and civil arrest orders. This unit is also tasked with executing high-risk evictions and all transport from other agencies. Additionally, this unit issues traffic citations, answers calls for service and conducts residential and business patrols.





Court Services Division

The Court Services Division continues to play a vital role in ensuring the safety, integrity, and effectiveness of judicial operations throughout the year. The division is responsible for securing courtrooms during active sessions, maintaining order, and safeguarding all judicial processes. Deputies assigned to Court Services provide a consistent and professional law enforcement presence, ensuring that proceedings can occur without interruption and that all participants—judges, staff, jurors, attorneys, and the public—remain safe.

In addition to its core security responsibilities, the division contributes significantly to two specialized court programs. Court Services personnel support the State Court’s DUI Program and the Magistrate Court’s Misdemeanor Mental Health Program, working directly with program staff as integrated team members. Deputies serve as the law enforcement component of these multidisciplinary teams, offering oversight, coordinating participant compliance, and providing essential safety and accountability functions.

Through these combined efforts, the Court Services Division strengthens both judicial operations and community-based interventions. Their work reflects the agency’s commitment to maintaining the orderly administration of justice while supporting innovative court programs designed to address the underlying causes of criminal behavior.

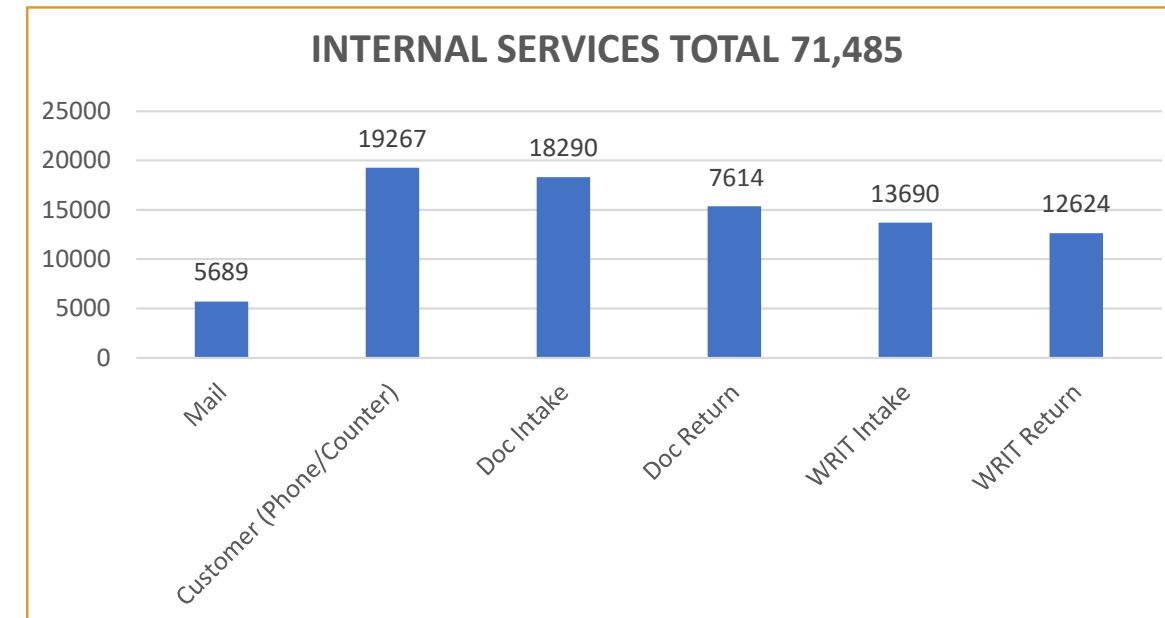

Internal Services

The Internal Services Unit is responsible for delivering essential support services to both internal departments and external customers. This unit oversees key operational areas including Human Resources, Finance, Property & Evidence, Quartermaster, and Civil Desk Customer Service.

The Civil Desk Customer Service team plays a vital role by receiving and processing legal documents from the Magistrate and State Courts. These include Civil Process, Dispossessory actions, Eviction Writs, and Fi.Fa. (Fieri Facias) orders. In addition to document processing, the Internal Services Unit provides critical administrative support to departmental leadership, ensuring efficient and effective operations across all service areas.



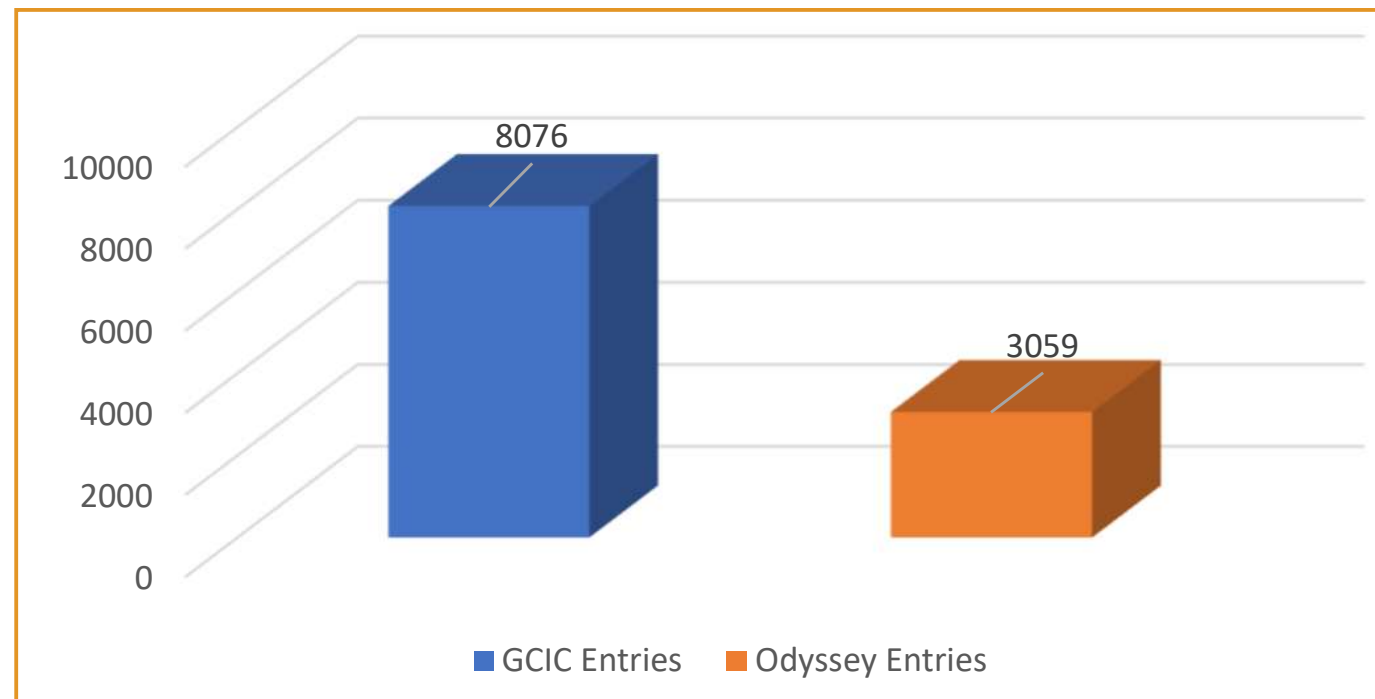

Georgia Crime Information Center (GCIC) is responsible for monitoring the system to determine the validity of criminal warrants filed in the Magistrate and State Court Clerk's Office. The GCIC section respond to the notification when a wanted person has been apprehended by another law enforcement agency whether locally or nationally. The GCIC manager ensures the security and integrity of the GCIC section is maintained according to GCIC Council rules and policies.

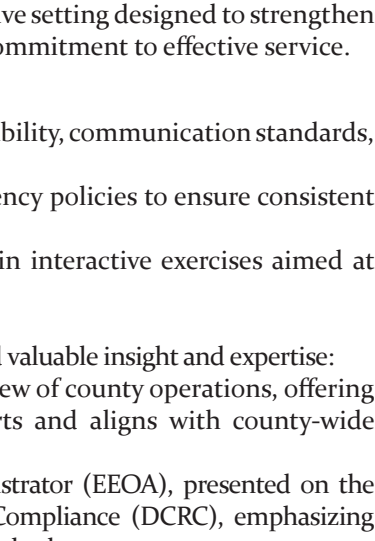
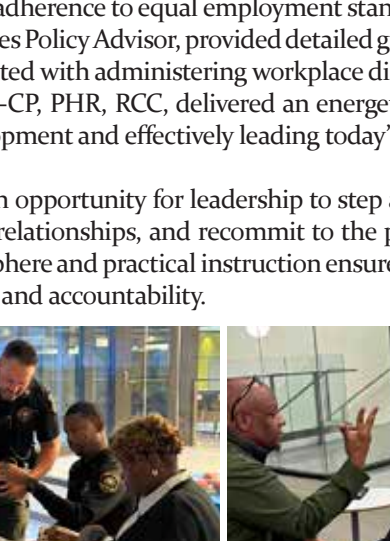
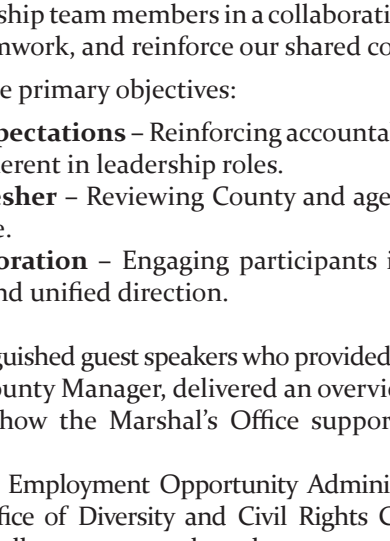
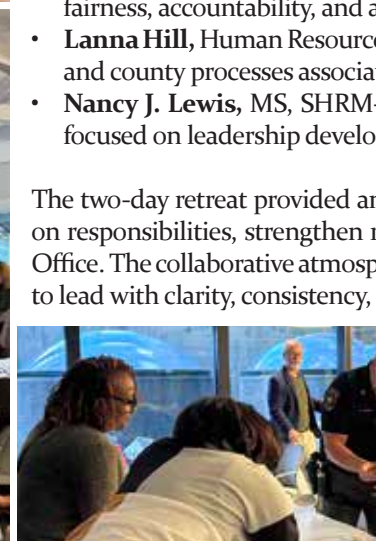
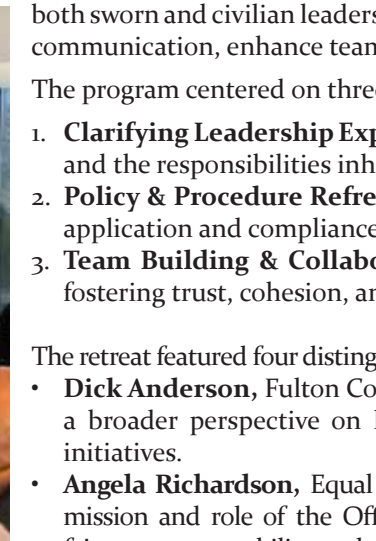
The program centered on three primary objectives:

1. **Clarifying Leadership Expectations** – Reinforcing accountability, communication standards, and the responsibilities inherent in leadership roles.
2. **Policy & Procedure Refresher** – Reviewing County and agency policies to ensure consistent application and compliance.
3. **Team Building & Collaboration** – Engaging participants in interactive exercises aimed at fostering trust, cohesion, and unified direction.

The retreat featured four distinguished guest speakers who provided valuable insight and expertise:

- **Dick Anderson**, Fulton County Manager, delivered an overview of county operations, offering a broader perspective on how the Marshal's Office supports and aligns with county-wide initiatives.
- **Angela Richardson**, Equal Employment Opportunity Administrator (EEOA), presented on the mission and role of the Office of Diversity and Civil Rights Compliance (DCRC), emphasizing fairness, accountability, and adherence to equal employment standards.
- **Lanna Hill**, Human Resources Policy Advisor, provided detailed guidance on the legal considerations and county processes associated with administering workplace discipline.
- **Nancy J. Lewis**, MS, SHRM-CP, PHR, RCC, delivered an energetic and thought-provoking session focused on leadership development and effectively leading today's generation of employees.

The two-day retreat provided an opportunity for leadership to step away from daily operations, reflect on responsibilities, strengthen relationships, and recommit to the principles that guide the Marshal's Office. The collaborative atmosphere and practical instruction ensured participants left better equipped to lead with clarity, consistency, and accountability.

Commitment to Career Development and Professional Excellence

At the core of our agency’s mission is a strong commitment to the career development of our employees and the continuous advancement of the agency as a whole. One of our primary goals is to uphold the highest standards of professionalism and knowledge across all levels of service. To support this, we have made significant investments in comprehensive training programs throughout the year.

We recognize the critical importance of well-trained deputies—particularly in their interactions with the citizens of Fulton County and with our public safety partners. Through ongoing professional development, we aim to ensure that every member of our team is equipped with the skills, knowledge, and confidence required to serve our community with integrity and excellence.

Initial Training

All new officers completed the Basic Mandate Training Program, a 408-hour curriculum that provides foundational law enforcement competencies required for certification by the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training Council (POST).

Field Training

Following POST certification, officers entered a 12-week Field Training Program, gaining hands-on experience across all agency divisions. This phase ensures readiness for real-world operational demands.

Annual In-Service Training

To maintain certification and stay current with evolving public safety practices, all sworn personnel completed **40 hours of state-mandated in-service training**. This year’s curriculum included: • De-Escalation Techniques • Use Of Force • Community Policing • Defensive Tactics • Firearms Training • Legislative Updates • Governor’s Public Safety Initiatives

Specialized training opportunities were provided based on agency needs and individual officer roles. These targeted programs enhance operational effectiveness and support our mission to serve the community with professionalism and integrity.

The Marshal's Fourth Annual “Loving Up, Not Locking Up”

Outreach for the Unhoused Community

The Marshal's Office proudly conducted its Fourth Annual “Loving Up, Not Locking Up” Outreach for the Unhoused Community, reaffirming its commitment to compassionate service and meaningful community engagement throughout Fulton County.

This year's outreach effort focused on providing essential personal care items, critical winter necessities that included blankets, hats, gloves, socks, and nutritious bag lunches to individuals experiencing a lack of housing in the Downtown Atlanta area. These items were thoughtfully assembled to meet immediate needs while offering comfort and dignity during the winter season.

Through the dedication of department personnel and community partners, the initiative successfully served 200 individuals. Beyond distributing supplies, staff members and volunteers engaged directly with recipients to offer encouragement, respect, and human connection.

The continued success of this initiative reflects the Marshal's Office steadfast mission to serve with respect and compassion. “Loving Up, Not Locking Up” is an example of how public service can extend beyond enforcement to proactive community support.

Educational Outreach with Atlanta Public Schools

We proudly and intentionally supported the educational program designed to foster trust and build positive relationships between students and first responders. This initiative allowed us to engage directly with young learners by visiting seven Fulton County Schools.

Our outreach efforts were strongly supported by both sworn officers and civilian staff, whose participation was instrumental in the success of these visits. During each session, we read selected books to the students, who were both excited and attentive throughout. The stories sparked genuine interest, with students eager to learn about the characters and their experiences.

At the conclusion of each reading session, we were met with enthusiastic engagement. Many students raised their hands to ask insightful questions—not only about the books themselves, but also about our roles and responsibilities within the community. These meaningful conversations served as a powerful reminder of the impact that positive interactions between first responders and youth can have.

We look forward to continuing this important initiative and strengthening our connection with the community through educational and engaging programs.

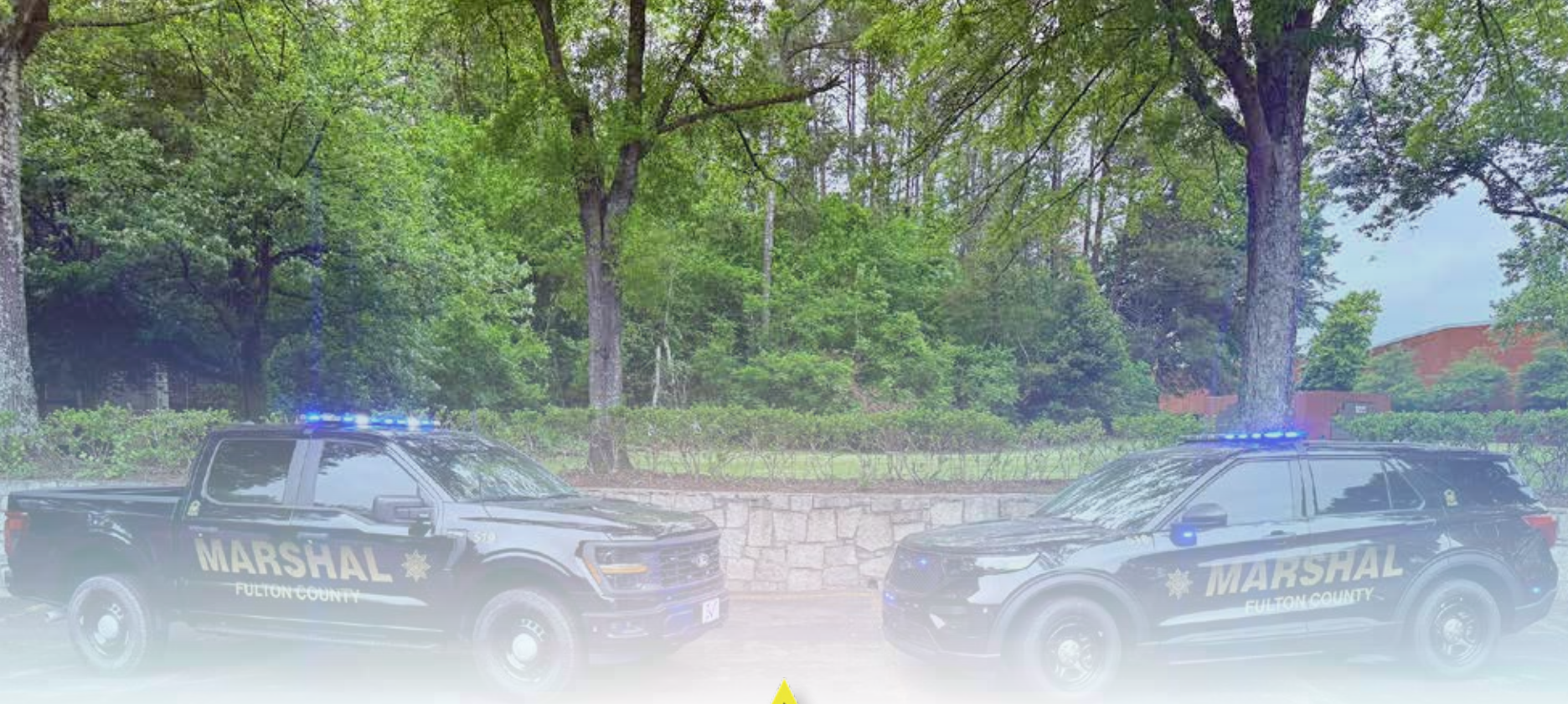
